### **CORONAVIRUS FORCED CANCELLATION OF THREE USBC EVENTS IN 2021**

After a 2020 season where COVID-19 forced the cancellation of the majority of USBC tournaments and events, things started to return to normal in 2021.

Despite that relative return to normalcy, there were three events in 2021 that were canceled as the USBC continued to exercise caution with respect to the coronavirus.

The 2021 USBC Team USA Trials and U.S. National Amateur Bowling Championships, scheduled for January 2-7 at Expo Bowl and Western Bowl in Indianapolis, was the first event to be taken off the 2021 schedule

That decision was soon followed by the cancellation of the 2021 USBC Senior Queens tournament that was slated for March 9-13 at the Gold Coast Hotel, Casino and Bowling Center in Las Vegas.

The final cancellation of 2021 was the 2021 USA Bowling National Championships. That event was scheduled for July 7-8 at multiple bowling centers in the Indianapolis area.

The good news is that all three events were back on the schedule in 2022. The USBC Team USA Trials and U.S. National Amateur Bowling Championships ran January 2-7 and the USBC Senior Queens was held March 18-21. Both of those events were contested at the Gold Coast Hotel, Casino and Bowling Center in Las Vegas.

Finally, the USA Bowling National Championships proceeded as planned July 13-14 in Grand Rapids, Michigan.





The 2021 USBC Open Championships, held at the South Point Bowling Plaza and South Point Bowling Center in Las Vegas, featured more than 38,000 bowlers and will be remembered for a its historical significance and noteworthy performances.

The tournament was back in action after a pandemic-forced one-year hiatus and welcomed 7,609 five-player teams to South Point from May 1-July 18. The total prize fund exceeded \$3.7 million.

Redemption was a prevailing theme and one of the sport's breakout stars turned in a near-record performance on the final day of competition.

The 2021 edition was the 117th Open Championships and marked the first time in history competition was split across two venues. All team bowling was held at the South Point Bowling Plaza, while doubles and singles took place at the South Point Bowling Center.

Among the year's 32 champions was Chris Via of Blacklick, Ohio, who bowled on the last team squad of the year July 17 and the final doubles and singles squad July 18.

The 29-year-old two-hander became the third competitor in tournament history to surpass the 2,300 mark in all-events, and he missed the all-time mark by just 23 pins.

Via, who won the 2021 U.S. Open in April 2021, kicked off his seventh Open Championships appearance with an 825 series in team. It was the year's first 800 in team competition and the second 800 overall.

He added 710 in doubles and 768 in singles for a 2,303 total.

Matt McNiel of Minneapolis owns the all-events record with 2,326.

In the team event, North Carolina's Chris Hans, Brian Locke and Kyle Troup got redemption for a sixth-place team finish in 2019.

The trio helped Before the 1st Frame 1 of Battleboro, North Carolina, to a 3,400 total and the Regular Team title on games of 1,063, 1,155 and 1,182.

Troup, a PBA Tour champion and a member of Team USA, led the 2021 surge with a 757 series and was followed by Dylan Macon (697), Hans (676), Locke (652) and Dennis Killough (618).

The Regular Doubles title went to a pair of repeat winners, Chris Pierson of West Bend, Wisconsin, and David Labinski of Milwaukee, whose first victory together at the Open Championships came in Team All-Events in 2018.

Both Open Championships veterans closed with three clutch strikes to steal the top spot by just four pins with a 1,466 total.

Pierson led the way with games of 269, 232 and 246 for a 747 series.

Lat. r s' i shot 204, 246 and 269 for a 719 total.

Kevin Bienko (2,226) and Chad Mee (2,042) teamed with their BowlU teammates Andrew Herbert (2,086), Ryan Reese (1,929) and Joseph DiNardo (1,675) to claim the 2021 Team All-Events title with a 9,958 total. Reese's performance included one of the 20 perfect games rolled at this year's Open Championships.

The 2021 Regular Singles winner, Andrew Anderson of Holly, Michigan, had the longest wait of all the Regular Division leaders.

Anderson filled his final frame May 25 to lock up the first 800 series of the tournament, and then the long wait began to see if his 802 series was enough for his second win on the tournament lanes. He had games of 269, 277 and 256.

Highlighting the action in the Standard Division, which debuted at the South Point Bowling Plaza in 2017, was a record performance in the team event.

Proformance Team 2 of Clermont, Florida, claimed the team title with games of 950 and 1,026, before a then-record 1,110 finale helped the team to the highest total in four years of Standard competition (3,086).

The effort was led by Billy Standridge, who finished with a 713 series on the strength of a 278 final game. He was joined by Charles Piker (687), Duane Podgorski (618), Sal Trevino (569) and Deanne Walsh (499).

In Classified Doubles, the husband-and-wife duo of Thomas and Sonia Holguin of Northlake, Texas, stole the spotlight with a 1,211 total. Their performance included a 667 series from Thomas while Sonia added a 544 set.

The 2021 Open Championships featured 20 perfect games, a dozen 299s and five 298s, while 25 additional bowlers rolled 11 consecutive strikes.

Additional highlights included 22 bowlers entering the event's 50-Year Club and two new members of the 60-Year Club, while USBC Hall of Famer Bob Hart Sr. of Suwanee, Georgia, became the 15th bowler to reach 65 years of Open Championships participation.

Just a few days before Hart's milestone appearance, Jamie Brooks of McKinney, became the 24th member of the 100,000-Pin Club.

The inaugural USBC Open Championships in 1901 featured 41 teams competing for a \$1,592 prize fund, and it now is known as the world's largest participatory sporting event. Bowlers now compete for a prize fund in the \$5 million range. In 115 years, the tournament has visited 49 cities in 26 states.

The 2022 event marked the tournament's sixth trip to Las Vegas and fourth visit to South Point. It marked the third time the event has been held in the same host city in back-to-back years.

The 101st edition of the United States Bowling Congress Women's Championships featured several record-breaking performances during its 72-day run at the National Bowling Stadium in Reno, Nevada.

The 2021 USBC Women's Championships kicked off April 23 and welcomed 2,552 four-player teams to Reno. Participants competed in four average-based divisions in team competition (Diamond, Ruby, Emerald and Sapphire) and six divisions in doubles, singles and all-events (Diamond, Ruby, Emerald, Sapphire, Amethyst and Topaz).

Colombia's Maria José Rodriguez and Guatemala's Sofia Granda finished the 2021 event at the top of the leaderboard in Diamond Doubles, posting the first 1,500-plus doubles score in tournament history with a 1,560 total.

Rodriguez became the ninth bowler at the Women's Championships to record an 800 series, rolling games of 245, 279 and 286 for an 810 series. Granda, who made her tournament debut, added games of 225, 269 and 256 for a 750 series.

The previous doubles record was held by USBC Hall of Famers Carolyn Dorin-Ballard and Lynda Barnes, who won the 2004 title with a 1,498 total.

The members of Bowl 2 Win of Mechanicville, New York, rolled games of 883, 1,003 and 923 for a 2,809 total, the second-highest team series since the Women's Championships switched from five- to four-player teams in 2014.

The performance was led by Team USA member Liz Kuhlkin's 752 series, and she was joined by Robin Orlikowski (704), Jessica Aiezza (696) and Suzanne Morine (657).

The four-player team series record is 2,819, rolled by Bowlieve In A Cure of Arlington, Texas, during the 2014 event.

Sharon Powers of Lakewood, Colorado, claimed a title in back-to-back Women's Championships appearances after rolling an 801 series in Diamond Singles.

Powers, who made her 45th tournament appearance in 2021, fired games of 289, 268 and 244 to become the 10th bowler to record an 800 series at the Women's Championships.

Her performance marked the second time a bowler has reached an 800 series in the singles event. Michelle Feldman of Auburn, New York, won Classic Singles in 2009 with an 816 series.

Malaysia's Shalin Zulkifli averaged more than 250 for her nine games at the 2021 event to lead the way in Diamond All-Events with a 2,253 total, the third-highest all-events score in tournament history.

Zulkifli rolled sets of 782 in team, 752 in doubles and 719 in singles.

Jodi Woessner of Oregon, Ohio, holds the all-events record at the Women's Championships with a 2,330 total, posted at the 2010 tournament in El Paso, Texas.

Three to swlers won multiple titles at the 2021 Women's Championships.

Shalanda Nunn of Lafayette, Indiana, captured wins in Sapphire Singles and Sapphire All-Events with scores of 671 and 1,740, respectively.

Nunn used games of 237, 253 and 181 to take over the top spot in singles, and she added sets of 587 in team and 482 in doubles to roll to the top of the leaderboard in all-events.

Malinda Carpenter of Colville, Washington, picked up a pair of titles in the Amethyst Division.

She took home Amethyst Doubles with Sharold Moser of Addy, Washington, with a 1,072 total. Carpenter rolled a 573 series, and Moser added 499 in the winning effort.

Carpenter added 520 in team and 474 in singles to also claim the top spot in Amethyst All-Events with a 1,567 total.

Rebecca Grant of Lake Havasu City, Arizona, finished the 2021 event at the top of the Topaz Doubles and Topaz All-Events standings.

Grant paired with Diena Wasson of Enumclaw, Washington, to win Topaz Doubles with a 907 total. Grant had a 531 series, and Wasson tallied 376.

Grant added sets of 514 in singles and 461 in team to also take the top spot in Topaz All-Events with a 1,506 total.

Joan Boesen of Bullhead City, Arizona, finished at the top of Topaz Singles with a 518 series.

In addition to the two 800 series rolled at the 2021 event, two bowlers also rolled 300 games at the National Bowling Stadium.

Tina Williams of Pflugerville, Texas, was the first player to achieve the feat, as she started her doubles set with 12 consecutive strikes.

Karen Barcal of Albuquerque, New Mexico, rolled 300 during her final game of team competition. Barcal made a second run at perfection during her doubles set the following day, rolling 299 in her second game on the way to a 787 series.

Barcal is the first bowler at the Women's Championships to roll both a 300 and 299 on the championship lanes.

Ruth Heath-Trott of Montpelier, Ohio, was the only bowler at the 2021 event to celebrate reaching 50 years of tournament participation.

The 2021 Women's Championships did take a brief hiatus in May to welcome the USBC Queens to the National Bowling Stadium. The Queens is a major championship on the PWBA Tour.

Julia Bond of Aurora, Illinois, defeated 2011 Queens champion Missy Parkin of Laguna Hills, California, in the title match, 238-154, to capture her second career PWBA Tour title and first major championship.

Denmark's Thomas Larsen said he was excited to return to the National Bowling Stadium in Reno, Nevada, and proved it by defeating top seed Jesper Svensson of Sweden, 197-176, for his third Professional Bowlers Association Tour title and first major victory of his career at the 2021 United States Bowling Congress Masters.

Larsen, a 31-year-old right-hander, became the first bowler from Denmark to win the event.

The Masters stepladder was broadcast live on Fox Sports' FS1. The event was the fourth of five majors on the 2021 PBA Tour calendar, and the win earned Larsen a \$30,000 top prize.

"Coming to Reno is big-time bowling, and it's such an awesome venue, where I always seem to be able to match up and bowl well," Larsen said. "There were a lot of nerves today and a few shots where I couldn't even feel my legs, but I'm glad I was able to throw enough shots to come away with the win."

Larsen fell behind early in the final against Svensson, but back-to-back splits from Svensson in the seventh (4-6-7-10) and eighth (3-7) frames, the second of which he was able to convert, allowed Larsen to rally back for a chance to lock up the game and title.

After striking in the ninth frame, a double and one pin would've sealed the victory. He struck on his first 10th-frame offering but missed left on his second, leaving a 3 pin.

Svensson, a 26-year-old Swedish two-hander, could've thrown three strikes in his final frame for a single-pin victory. The multi-time PBA Tour champion, who was looking for his second major title, left a 7 pin on his first shot to fall short.

In the semifinal, Larsen used four consecutive strikes to pull away from Junior Team USA's Spencer Robarge of Springfield, Missouri, 213-200.

Robarge, 18, was looking to become the youngest Masters winner, youngest bowler in history to win a PBA Tour event, and the first amateur to claim the Masters title since 2002.

Anthony Simonsen was 19 years and 39 days old when he won in

Robarge earned his spot in the semifinal with a 224-166 win over PBA Tour champion Jason Sterner of Rochester, New York. Robarge started the telecast by defeating Chris Via of Springfield, Ohio, 213-194.

All rounds of qualifying and match play from the 2021 Masters were broadcast live on BowlTV.com and simulcast to FloBowling.

The event, which was first held in 1951, featured more than 200 players, who bowled three five-game qualifying blocks over three days, with total pinfall determining the 63 bowlers who joined defending champion Jakob Butturff of Tempe, Arizona, in the bracket.

Butturff finished tied for 33rd.

Julia Bond of Aurora, Illinois, capped a dominating performance at the National Bowling Stadium by winning her first major championship at the 2021 United States Bowling Congress Queens.

The 25-year-old right-hander went undefeated through the doubleelimination bracket and recorded her second win of the 2021 Professional Women's Bowling Association Tour season by defeating 2011 USBC Queens champion Missy Parkin of Laguna Hills, California, in the title match, 238-154.

Bond claimed the coveted tiara and the \$20,000 first-place prize. Parkin earned \$10,000 for her runner-up finish.

The finals of the 2021 Oueens were broadcast on BowlTV.com.

"This feels great," said Bond, who won her first career national tour title in January 2021 at the PWBA Hall of Fame Classic. "It's a very validating feeling to see that I'm on the right path, making good choices and learning."

Bond, who had to be defeated twice as the top seed for the stepladder finals in the true double-elimination format, quickly took the lead in the title match, with Parkin opening in two of her first four frames.

Bond stayed clean through the first six frames and then tossed six consecutive strikes to seal the victory.

Bond noted how quickly the 42-foot oil pattern was transitioning during her warm-up shots as she waited for the opportunity to start the title match, and she was able to see the path she wanted to take.

The three-time PWBA Regional champion also was able to rely on things she learned Monday in the final match in the winners bracket against Liz Kuhlkin of Schenectady, New York. Bond rolled 257 in the final game of that match after making a jump to the left. She recorded the win and earned the top seed, 663-620.

Parkin won two matches to advance to the final, defeating England's Verity Crawley, 236-220, before striking out in the ninth and 10th frames of her semifinal match to defeat Kuhlkin, 223-211.

The stepladder finals started with Crawley defeating Latvia's Diana Zavjalova, 197-172.

Zavjalova was looking to become the third player to win three Queens titles after capturing the tiara in 2013 and 2017.

The 2021 event started with 110 competitors. After 15 games of qualifying over three days, the top 63 players and Ukraine's Dasha Kovalova, who was guaranteed a spot in the bracket as the defending champion, advanced to match play.

Kovalova finished tied for 25th place.

The USBC Queens, a major event on the PWBA Tour, features the top women competitors from around the world vying for the coveted tiara and a place on the historic list of champions. The event was first held in 1961.

Chris Via of Springfield, Ohio, claimed the 2021 U.S. Open with a dramatic 214-213 victory over Jakob Butturff of Tempe, Arizona, at the famed National Bowling Stadium in Reno, Nevada.

The 29-year-old right-hander earned his first career Professional Bowlers Association win and the \$30,000 top prize. The show aired live on FOX Sports' FS1 and was the last of five majors on the 2021 PBA Tour schedule.

The title tilt came down to the final delivery of the long week as Butturff had the opportunity to throw three strikes in his final frame to force a roll-off, but he fell short, leaving a 2 pin after delivering the first two strikes.

"I fully expected to be bowling in a roll-off," said Via. "It was more shock at first when he didn't get it, then the realization that I won, and I'm a major champion. To do it at this event, and at the Stadium, is a dream come true."

The loss marked the third runner-up finish for Butturff at the U.S. Open, with the first two coming in 2017 and 2018. He also lost the 2018 event by a single pin, falling 207-206 to England's Dom Barrett.

Butturff entered the stepladder as the second seed. The left-hander was in complete control in the semifinal as he rolled to a 257-203 win over 18-year-old Junior Team USA member Anthony Neuer of Lewisburg, Pennsylvania.

Neuer was looking to become the youngest bowler to win a major title on the PBA Tour.

Though he fell short of that goal, he did add his name to the record book by becoming the fourth bowler in history, and first since 1991, to pick up the 7-10 split on a PBA telecast.

Neuer, a four-time member of Junior Team USA, earned his spot in the semifinal by striking in six of his first eight frames in Match 2 to defeat Cristian Azcona of Clermont, Florida, 236-200.

The day's opening match was a high-scoring battle between Azcona and PBA Tour champion Jason Stemer of Rochester, New York.

Azcona started with four consecutive strikes and delivered three more in his final frame to lock out the 37-year-old right-hander, 258-256.

The 2021 U.S. Open started with 108 competitors, all of whom bowled 24 games of qualifying across three oil patterns, before total pinfall determined the 36 bowlers who advanced to the Cashers' Round on a fourth lane condition.

The final pattern, a 42-foot condition, was used throughout match play and was featured again on the TV show.

Following the Cashers' Round, 32-game pinfall totals determined the 24 players for round-robin match play, and their 56-game totals, including 30 bonus pins for each match they won, determined the five bowlers for Sunday's stepladder.

The majority of the competitors earned direct entry into the event based on their on-lane performances throughout 2020, while 43 bowlers advanced to the 108-player field through an eight-game pretournament qualifier.

Each round of qualifying and match play at the 2021 U.S. Open was broadcast live at BowlTV.com and simulcast on FloBowling.

The U.S. Open often is regarded as one of the most challenging events in the sport, featuring a 56-game marathon on demanding playing conditions to determine the finalists. Participants in the select field earned their spots in the field based on their on-lane performances throughout the previous year.

Known as the Bowling Proprietors' Association of America All-Star until 1971, the U.S. Open includes a long and rich history, with the winner receiving the coveted green jacket.

Josie Barnes of Hermitage, Tennessee, made history by defeating Singapore's Cherie Tan, 198-194, to win the U.S. Women's Open. The \$100,000 first-place check earned by Barnes is the biggest prize check ever awarded at a professional women's bowling event.

The win, televised live on CBS Sports Network from Double Decker Lanes in Rohnert Park, California, was the first major championship for the 33-year-old right-hander, and her fourth Professional Women's Bowling Association Tour title overall. Barnes also collected the event's coveted green jacket and iconic U.S. Women's Open trophy.

"Going into this week, I really was trying to find some good things about this season, and while there were a few, there weren't many," said Barnes. "After tonight, I feel like I can say it was the best season ever."

The final match was settled with Barnes on the bench and Tan stepping up needing a double and five pins in her final frame to secure the victory.

The 33-year-old left-hander got the first strike, but she left the 3-6 combination on her second shot to fall short.

Having finished first, Barnes had the opportunity to lock up the win with a double of her own, but the first shot of her 10th frame crossed over and left a 9 pin. After the spare, she got six pins on her fill ball. That left Tan needing a double in the 10th that ultimately eluded her.

The historic title tilt also was a rematch of the final game of the 2019

Nationwide PWBA Greater Cleveland Open, where Barnes also came out on top. That was her last visit to the winner's circle.

Tan, who owns two PWBA Tour titles, including a major win at the 2019 PWBA Players Championship, earned \$50,000 for the runner-up finish.

The biggest first-place prize in a women's bowling event prior to the 2021 U.S. Women's Open came in 2001, when USBC Hall of Famer Kim Kearney collected \$55,000 for the first of her two U.S. Women's Open titles.

To earn her chance at history, Tan first had to defeat fellow left-hander Shannon Pluhowsky of Dayton, Ohio. They were two of the three southpaws in the field at Double Decker Lanes.

Tan struck twice in the match and converted the 2-4-7 combination in her final frame to slip past Pluhowsky, 178-166.

Pluhowsky, 39, was seeking her second major title, and first since winning the Queens in 2006.

Before the meeting with Tan, Pluhowsky kicked off her seventh championship-round appearance at a major in a major way, tossing 10 strikes in a 279-211 victory against 2021 PWBA Tour Rookie of the Year front-runner Stephanie Zavala of Downey, California.

Zavala, a 25-year-old right-hander, has earned two PWBA Tour titles in her rookie season, and this show was her fourth stepladder appearance of the year.

It took Zavala a few frames to settle in for her first PWBA show on live TV, but she was able to overcome two splits in the first three frames of the opening match to collect a 220-199 win over two-time Queens champion Diana Zavjalova of Latvia.

Zavala rallied with six consecutive strikes, starting in the fifth frame, while Zavjalova, a 30-year-old right-hander, hit the pocket 11 times but failed to record a double.

The week started with 71 competitors, who bowled 24 games across three days and three oil patterns, before the field was cut to the top 24 for Round 4 and match play. A fourth lane condition was introduced for Round 4, match play and the championship round. Patterns ranged from 36-46 feet.

The 56-game totals, including 30 bonus pins for each win in match play, determined the five players advancing to the stepladder finals.

All rounds of qualifying and match play were broadcast live at BowlTV.com.





WHOLE TEAM NOT PICTURED

All United States Bowling Congress members have the opportunity to represent their country in international competition as members of Team USA, Junior Team USA, Senior Team USA or Para Team USA.

As has become tradition, the year typically kicks off with the USBC Team USA Trials and U.S. National Amateur Bowling Championships, where the nation's best battle over five days and a variety of challenging lane conditions for the opportunity to represent the Team USA program in international competition.

The events then conclude with the introduction of Team USA and Junior Team USA for the calendar year, with the Junior Team USA rosters also including those who qualified for the team through the Junior Gold Championships.

Unfortunately, due to the lingering effects of COVID-19, the events were not held in 2021. Instead, all of those who had qualified for the respective teams in 2020, earned an additional year on those teams — a small consolation for the opportunities missed by the pandemic and low profile the Team USA program had in 2020.

Following a lengthy hiatus, international bowling competition resumed in late 2021, and the Team USA program returned to action for a handful of successful events on two continents.

Team members first hit the friendly skies in October for a trip to Cali, Colombia, for the 2021 PANAM Bowling Elite Championships and simultaneous 2021 edition of the PANAM Bowling Champion of Champions.

The tournaments were held at Bolera Departamental and included the best bowlers from North, Central and South America, as well as the Caribbean.

There were 30 medals up for grabs at the Elite Championships and two available for the Champion of Champions.

Team USA picked up 13 medals and was followed by Mexico (7), Puerto Rico (4), Canada (4), Colombia (2), Aruba (1) and Costa Rica (1).

Among the highlights for Team USA men at the PANAM Elite Championships in Colombia were gold medals in doubles (Nick Pate and Kyle Sherman), team (Pate, Sherman, Andrew Anderson, Cameron Crowe, Kristopher Prather and Matt Russo) and all-events (Russo).

The women found the top of the podium in doubles (Breanna Clemmer and Lauren Pate), women's trios (Julia Bond, Bryanna Coté and Sydney Brummett), women's team (Bond, Brummett, Clemmer, Coté, Pate and Gazmine Mason) and women's all-events (Clemmer).

Two men and two women from each country were designated by

the coaches to have their scores used toward the 2021 edition of the Champion of Champions.

The top four countries, based on the combined 24-game pinfall totals in each gender classification, plus the United States, qualified for the 2022 World Games. Because that event is being held in Birmingham, Alabama, the United States automatically gets a spot as the host nation.

The Team USA representatives for the Champion of Champions event were Anderson, Russo, Bond and Coté.

The countries that qualified for the World Games from the men's field were Puerto Rico, Colombia, Costa Rica and Canada. For the women, Colombia, Mexico, Puerto Rico and Aruba advanced.

Competitors initially thought a spot in the World Games was all that was on the line for this year's Champion of Champions, but the top performers also were awarded gold medals based on their 24-game totals.

Russo claimed the prize on the men's side, marking his fifth Champion of Champions gold medal. He won four in four opportunities during his Team USA debut in 2018. He now has seven gold medals in 10 events. The women's gold medal went to Mexico's Iliana Lomeli.

The second destination of the year for Team USA was the United Arab Emirates, as Dubai played host to a trio of world championship events – International Bowling Federation Super World Championships, IBF Para World Championships and IBF Masters (formerly Senior) World Championships.

Team members, coaches and staff were on-site at the Dubai International Bowling Centre for most of the month of November and found success at each event.

The list of women selected to represent the United States at the Super World Championships included a quartet of past world champions — Kelly Kulick of Union, New Jersey; Danielle McEwan of Stony Point, New York; Missy Parkin of Laguna Hills, California; and Jordan Richard of Maumee, Ohio.

The men's team included three world champions and a first-timer – Anderson of Holly, Michigan; Jakob Butturff of Tempe, Arizona; AJ Johnson of Oswego, Illinois; and Prather of Plainfield, Illinois.

The Super World Championships marked the debut of some changes, beyond just the shift from World Bowling to IBF.

As part of the new design of the event, team competition will shift from five players to four, while everything after the tournament-opening singles event was contested using a variation of Baker scoring.

In the traditional Baker format, each member of a five-player team bowls two frames, and the team members work together to complete a game. The leadoff bowler bowls the first and sixth frames, the next team member completes the second and seventh frames and so on.

In Dubai, the concept was adapted for doubles, trios and the two team events (traditional and mixed), with strategy determining which players in the lineup bowled extra frames, where applicable.

The Team USA men and women all left Dubai with gold medals. The men won trios (all four received medals), and the women took home the team gold medal. Kulick and Parkin shared most valuable player honors on the women's side.

The men also claimed a bronze medal in doubles (Anderson and Prather), while the inaugural mixed doubles event ended with a silver medal for Team USA (Butturff, Kulick, Parkin and Prather).

The inaugural Para Bowling World Championships also yielded some serious hardware for the United States.

American Wheelchair Bowling Association Chairman Eddy Hutchens said one of the main focuses of the AWBA is getting people out of their homes and onto the lanes.

Hutchens used the week as the ultimate lead-by-example opportunity by traveling nearly 8,000 miles from Franktown, Colorado, to Dubai to represent Team USA.

The AWBA's top-ranked scratch player led a contingent of four bowlers into the Dubai International Bowling Centre, and all four team members will return to the United States with countless memories and at least one gold medal.

He was joined in the trailblazing effort by Shawn Beam of Burleson, Texas, Debra Freed of Framingham, Massachusetts, and Toodie Perry of Bakersfield, California, and they were among 21 bowlers from four countries competing for medals in singles, doubles, mixed doubles and

The participating nations included Hong Kong, India, Thailand and the United States.

Team USA won eight of the 20 medals available, and Hutchens was the first of the group to strike gold, taking home the men's singles title to kick off the tournament.

He was the top seed after six games of qualifying at the Dubai International Bowling Centre and defeated Thailand's Suphan Sinthusuwan, 165-116, to claim his place in the record book.

Not only was the accomplishment noteworthy from a historic perspective, it also was special because the gold-medal match took place on a one-ofa-kind stage under the Dubai night sky.

The custom two-lane venue was created for the medal rounds of the 2021 IBF Super World Championships and also hosted the men's and women's singles finals of the Para Bowling World Championships.

The setup was built outside in the Sports, Fitness and Wellbeing Hub at Expo 2020 Dubai, a multicultural event that included exhibits from more than 190 countries and lasted six months.





"To represent the United States, and to be the first ever to bring back a world championship - there are no words to describe it," Hutchens said. "It's right up there with when my boys were born. It's tears in the eyes. It was a national anthem like never before. There were goosebumps, and I don't get goosebumps, but I did when I got the call that I was going to be on Team USA, and then last night, it was goosebumps and smiles galore."

Hong Kong's Wong Mei-Lan, the top qualifier on the women's side after six games, defeated Thailand's Chantira Hutinan, 101-70, to become the first Para Bowling world champion in history.

Hutchens went on to medal in every discipline, collecting three gold medals and one silver medal.

He teamed with Beam to win the inaugural doubles event, which featured the same Baker format competitors experienced during the Super World Championships. In Baker doubles, the teammates alternate frames to complete one game.

The duo qualified second overall and earned one of four spots in the bracket-style semifinals.

They dispensed of Thailand's Kampa Pongtao and Choochat Sukjarern, 178-135, before topping their teammates, Sawai Padpong and Samsak Ruamsab, in the final, 159-146.

Beam previously found the spotlight in 2012, when he became the first bowler in a wheelchair to roll a USBC-certified perfect game.

Beam's week started with a bronze medal in singles. He finished qualifying five pins shy of an opportunity to bowl against Hutchens for the gold medal.

Freed and Perry also made the podium in singles, each earning a bronze medal, and their collective effort in doubles helped them improve to silver. They finished behind Thailand's Hutinan and Paramee Panyachaem.

Hutchens and Perry added a silver medal in mixed doubles, but that only served as a warmup for the coveted team event, where Team USA cruised to the gold medal, outdistancing Thailand, 358-338, in the three-game

total-pinfall match. Team also featured a modified Baker format.

The four newest Team USA members were selected by the USBC National Selection Committee to represent Team USA in the W1 category of the IBF Para Bowling World Championships.

The W1 Para/Amputee Classification incorporates all wheelchair classifications. It includes leg amputees, cerebral palsy (with functional hands), and Les Autres athletes with mobility disfunction. All must compete from a wheelchair and follow the rules of play, along with modified rules established for this discipline.

In future Para Bowling World Championships, there also will be a W2 classification for wheelchair users with quadriplegia. All participants in 2021 chose to compete in the W1 category.

The Masters World Championships was the final event in Dubai.

Team USA was represented by Chris Barnes of Denton, Texas; Parker Bohn III of Jackson, New Jersey; Tom Hess of Granger, Iowa; and Bob Learn Jr. of Columbia, Tennessee. The women's roster included Debbie Ayers of La Mesa, California; Tracy Calfee of Flat Rock, North Carolina; Tish Johnson of Colorado Springs, Colorado; and Sharon Powers of Lakewood, Colorado.

In previous events, the United States had been dominant, but gold medals were tougher to come by with the new format, which carried through all three championships.

Hess, a newcomer and the 2021 Professional Bowlers Association Player and Rookie of the Year, debuted in style, claiming the gold medal in men's singles, but that would be the last time he stood atop the podium. He and Barnes earned a bronze medal in doubles.

On the women's side, there were bronze medals in singles (Johnson), doubles (Johnson and Powers) and team (Ayers, Calfee, Johnson and Powers).

The group mixed things up and took home a bronze medal in mixed doubles (Calfee, Powers, Bohn and Learn).

The Wichita State women and men swept the titles at the 2021 Intercollegiate Team Championships for the third time in program history (1994, 2009) and became the first team since Webber International in 2012 to win both titles in the same season. The wins marked Wichita's 12th men's title and 10th women's title at the ITC, which both are records.

The title match in the women's team final finished in dramatic fashion, with Wichita State junior and National Collegiate Bowling Coaches Association Most Valuable Player Madison Janack delivering three strikes in the 10th frame of the deciding game of the best-of-five Baker match to shut out North Carolina A&T, 247-217.

Wichita State and North Carolina A&T had exchanged victories through the first four games to set up the exciting finale. In Game 5, the Shockers delivered three consecutive strikes, starting in the seventh frame, before handing the ball to Janack for the 10th.

North Carolina A&T, which was looking for its second ITC title, rolled four consecutive strikes in the middle of Game 5, and a strike in the ninth frame forced Janack to get two strikes and one pin to lock up the title.

The 2021 championship team for Wichita State featured Janack, Sierra Ciesiolka, Madisyn Hansen, Addie Herzberg, Sydney Hollinger, Sarah Klassen and Olivia Komorowski.

The men's team title also came down to the fifth game between Wichita State and St. Ambrose in a low-scoring championship round. Through the first four games, only one team had reached the 200 mark (Wichita State in a 200-167 victory in Game 3).

In Game 5, the Shockers started with three consecutive strikes and maintained an advantage, as St. Ambrose opened in four of its first six frames. Wichita State claimed the game, and title, with a 188-146 win.

The Wichita State roster featured Brandon Biondo, Briley Haugh, Cameron Hurwitz, Alec Keplinger, Richard Paul III, TJ Rock and Nick Sommer.

The winners of the 2021 Intercollegiate Singles Championships were Pete Vergos of Calumet and Katie Robb of Delaware State.

Vergos claimed the first national championship for Calumet with a 205-167 victory over Wichita State's Keplinger.

Vergos started strong in the title match. After a spare in the first frame, he rolled three consecutive strikes to build an early lead. Keplinger was struggling with his ball reaction after switching from urethane to reactive resin.

The two-time NCBCA All-American briefly opened the window for Keplinger with a missed 10 pin in the fifth frame, but Vergos stayed clean for the remainder of the game to roll to the title. Keplinger tossed a double in the fifth and sixth frames but followed with opens in the seventh and eighth frames.

Vergos rolled seven consecutive strikes to start his semifinal match against St. Ambrose's Jordan Monnens on the way to a 254-192 win and a spot in the final. Keplinger advanced to the championship match by defeating Lindenwood's Andrew Sacks, 212-183.

Robb brought home the first USBC national title to Delaware State with a 186-166 win over North Carolina A&T's Ana Olaya.

Robb was down 12 pins through four frames in the title match after back-to-back opens in the third and fourth frames. She made her move in the seventh and eighth frames, rolling a double, after Olaya opened in the seventh frame.

With Olaya finishing the title tilt first, Robb stepped up in the final frame needing nine pins to claim the victory. She rolled a strike to secure the win.

The ISC title also allowed Robb to join Delaware State head coach Elysia Current in the winner's circle at the national singles event. Current captured the 2007 ISC title while competing for Wichita State.

Robb advanced to the title match by defeating McKendree's Isabel Allen in the semifinals, 215-195. Olaya earned her spot in the final with a 204-189 win against Indiana Tech's Maryssa Carey.

Teams and individuals competing at the Spectrum Entertainment Complex earned their spots at the ITC and ISC through four sectional qualifiers held throughout the country in April 2021.

Teams had to place in the top four after 40 Baker games in their respective sectionals to advance to the ITC, while individuals needed to finish in the top six at their sectionals based on six-game pinfall totals.

The 2021 Junior Gold Championships featured a field of 3,129 young bowlers and crowned eight national champions. The tournament took place across six bowling centers in the Indianapolis area, with the finals in each division taking place at Expo Bowl.

Champions were decided in four age divisions – U12, U15, U18 and U20. The stepladder finals in each division featured three athletes, with the top seed having to be defeated twice in the double-elimination format.

In the U20 girls division, Brooke Roberts of Port Orange, Florida, started with strikes in four of her first five frames and went on to defeat Morgan Nunn of Oklahoma City, 188-140 victory.

Nunn advanced to the title match by defeating 2019 champion Patricia Rosales of Orlando, Florida, 190-175.

Alec Keplinger of Coldwater, Michigan, the 2019 U20 champion, returned to the title match in the boys division after delivering a 207-191 win over Tristin Davis of Woodstock, Georgia, in the semifinal.

A high-scoring title match against Cameron Crowe of Orland Park, Illinois, left both athletes with the chance to roll 258 heading into the 10th frame. Keplinger stepped up first and was unable to convert a 6-10 combination, allowing Crowe to cover the 3-6-9 on the way to a 232-226 win.

The U20 division had 61 girls and 129 boys.

The semifinal in the U18 girls division featured Victoria Varano of Stony Point, New York, posting a 211-168 win to advance against Elena Carr of Hilton, New York.

In the final, Jaelle Hamman of Jarrell, Texas, rolled a pair of doubles early in the match against Varano and stayed clean to take home the hardware with a 225-163 victory.

Edgar Burgos of St. Charles, Illinois, fired nine strikes in the semifinal of the U18 boys division to claim a 263-212 win against Silas Limes of Wichita, Kansas.

The title match between Brandon Bohn of Jackson, New Jersey, and Burgos came down to the final frame. Bohn, the U12 champion in 2017, had the chance to shut out Burgos with a double, but he left a 10 pin on his second delivery, giving Burgos an opportunity to strike out to force a second game for the title.

Burgos' first offering left the 7 pin, allowing Bohn to record the win, 232-200.

The U18 division had 558 girls and 1,166 boys.

In U15, Kayla Starr of Crofton, Maryland, advanced to the girls final with a 209-131 victory over Sydney Bohn of Jackson, New Jersey.

Kayla then won the opening match of the title tilt, 193-187, over top seed Savannah Taillon of Concord, North Carolina, to force a deciding game for

In the second game, Savannah struck in her ninth frame and on her first delivery in the 10th frame to lock up the victory, 212-169.

Trevor Ashby of Rawlings, Maryland, made his way to the U15 boys final with a semifinal victory over Ethan Caruso of Channahon, Illinois, 222-193.

Trevor maintained the momentum in Game 1 of the championship against Landin Jordan of Sycamore, Illinois, recording a 257-209 win to extend the match.

Landin, the top seed, made a ball change late in Game 1 and got dialed in, rolling eight strikes in Game 2 to finish with a 248-182 win.

The U15 division had 298 girls and 630 boys.

The semifinal match in the U12 girls division featured Larielle Tharps of Orlando, Florida, and Bella Castillo of Odessa, Texas. Larielle won the match to advance, 172-156.

In the final, Baylie Massingill of Troy, Ohio, needed a mark in her 10th frame to secure the U12 win, and she delivered a strike to clinch the match against Larielle, 201-184.

In the boys division for U12, the opening match of the stepladder resulted in a 256-182 victory for Kai Strothers of Maplewood, New Jersey, over Anthony Swanson of Evanston, Illinois.

Kai recorded a narrow 166-161 win against top seed Matteo Quintero of Smyrna, Tennessee, to push the championship match to a second game.

Matteo converted a 3-6-9-10 combination in his 10th frame to force Kai to record a mark and fill 18 pins in his final frame. Kai left a 2-4-6-10 split he was unable to convert, though, allowing Matteo to claim the title, 157-148.

The U12 division had 92 girls and 195 boys.

Competitors bowled 16 qualifying games over four days, before the field was cut.

Those advancing in the U12 division then bowled an additional four games to trim the field to the top eight boys and top eight girls for match play.

For the U15, U18 and U20 divisions, competitors bowled an additional five games before a second cut was made, and those remaining bowled an additional five games to determine the 16 bowlers advancing to match

The format for match play, leading up to the stepladder, featured two-game total-pinfall contests in a double-elimination bracket.

The 2021 Bowling.com Youth Open Championships welcomed 830 competitors and 174 four-player teams to participate in four age-based divisions at All Star Bowl in Indianapolis.

The 2021 tournament featured 22 players claiming multiple titles. From that group of champions, five recorded victories in three events and a pair of bowlers each won four titles.

Additionally, 13 bowlers captured wins at the Youth Open Championships for the second consecutive time, with five of those competitors now having claimed at least one victory in each of their last three visits to the event.

The 2020 tournament was canceled due to COVID-19.

The members of Here Comes Trouble, this year's U12 Handicap Team champion, took home the most hardware in 2021, combining for 14 wins in Indianapolis.

Lindsay Greim of Poway, California, and Jon Verde of Las Vegas each recorded four victories, while Bella Castillo of Odessa, Texas, and Macey Bates of Fremont, Nebraska, each won three titles.

Along with the team win with a 2,652 handicap total, Lindsay paired with Bella to win U12 Scratch Doubles (1,142) and added victories in the girls division of U12 Scratch Singles (540) and U12 Scratch All-Events (1,668).

Bella also won the U12 Handicap All-Events title with a 2,217 total, which gives the pair 11 wins in their last two appearances at the Youth Open Championships. They won a doubles title in 2019 (U10 Scratch Doubles), while Lindsay captured the top spot in U10 Scratch Singles and Bella won U10 Scratch All-Events.

Jon added a pair of doubles titles with Macey in 2021, winning the scratch (1,028) and handicap (1,430) titles in U10. Jon's fourth title came in U10 Scratch All-Events with a 1,740 nine-game total.

Other bowlers claiming three victories at the 2021 Youth Open Championships included teammates Alia Sharif of Berea, Ohio (U15 Handicap Team, U10 Girls Handicap Singles and U10 Girls Handicap All-Events), and Cole Florack of Middleburg Heights, Ohio (U15 Handicap Team, U12 Boys Handicap Singles and U12 Boys Handicap All-Events), and Kimberlyn Hamlin of Ponca City, Oklahoma.

Kimberlyn paired with Jessica Hamlin, also from Ponca City, to win U18 Girls Handicap Doubles with a 1,422 total and added wins in U15 Handicap Singles (780) and U15 Handicap All-Events (2,248).

Kimberlyn has recorded five victories in her last three appearances at the Youth Open Championships.

Youth athletes joining Kimberlyn in the winner's circle for a third consecutive appearance at the Youth Open Championships are Jillian Martin of Stow, Ohio (won U18 Girls Scratch All-Events in 2021); Avery Domaguin of San Diego (U15 Girls Scratch All-Events); Sebastian Huffman of Las Vegas (U15 Scratch Team); and Donaven Kline of Jackson, New Jersey (U12 Boys Scratch Singles).

The top overall score in the team event at the 2021 Youth Open Championships also is the highest three-game series for USBC Youth members from the 2020-2021 season.

The members of The Storm Troopers averaged more than 243 as a group to win the U18 Scratch Team title with a 2,922 total.

Brandon Bonta of Wichita, Kansas, rolled a 781 series and was joined by Spencer Robarge of Springfield, Missouri (732), Silas Lira of Tampa, Florida (717), and Julian Salinas of Richmond, Texas (692). The team rolled games of 960, 961 and 1,001.

Bonta, Robarge and Lira were part of the group that won the U20 Scratch Team title in 2019, and Lira added a second win in 2021 by claiming the boys U18 Scratch All-Events crown with a 2,095 total.

In addition to the winning performances, a pair of bowlers rolled perfect games.

Daniel Robertson of Jackson, New Jersey, shot 300 during his team competition July 7. The following day, Kory Driver of Ormond Beach, Florida, was perfect during his team event.

Bowling.com awards a \$100 scholarship to any competitor who rolls a 300 game or 800 series during the Youth Open Championships.

The Youth Open Championships is a non-qualifying event open to any United States Bowling Congress Youth member. The tournament is held in the same city as the Junior Gold Championships to allow youth bowlers to compete in both national events.

Youth athletes bowl three games each of singles, doubles and team, with the combined scores from those events determining the optional all-events score. There are four age-based divisions – U10, U12, U15 and U18 – with separate divisions for boys and girls. There also are optional handicap divisions in each event and age division.

Tom Hess of Granger, Iowa, walked into the 56-lane Sam's Town Bowling Center knowing exactly how much was on the line at the 2021 United States Bowling Senior Masters, and he did all the right things to help finish off a dream season on the Professional Bowlers Association 50 Tour.

The 51-year-old right-hander defeated top seed Chris Barnes of Denton, Texas, two times, 278-226 and 237-203, to win the coveted USBC Senior Masters title and \$20,000 top prize, which also locked up the PBA50 Player and Rookie of the Year awards.

The victory made Hess the fourth player in history to win both the USBC Masters and Senior Masters and third to win both the PBA50 Senior U.S. Open and Senior Masters in the same season. He won the Masters in 2011 and defeated Barnes in the title match of the 2021 Senior U.S. Open.

The entire 2021 Senior Masters, including the stepladder finals, was broadcast live on BowlTV.

"To be able to stay present and bowl those five games today was an unbelievable experience," Hess said. "I wasn't thinking about anything but staying down at the line and making good shots. When I stayed down, they were on target, and I'd done all I could do. Then, it was a matter of whether they struck or not, and I was fortunate to throw enough strikes today."

The five-player championship round also included three USBC and

PBA Hall of Famers and a newcomer to the senior circuit, and Hess averaged more than 246 over five games to climb the stepladder from the No. 4 spot.

He opened the day with a 247-212 win against another first-time participant, Donnie Hogue of Akron, Ohio, and then topped two-time Senior Masters champion Pete Weber of St. Ann, Missouri, the first of the three hall of famers, 201-183.

Effectively cycling through his arsenal helped keep Hess on track, and he piled on the strikes against Doug Kent of Newark, New York, winning 269-216, to set up the meeting with Barnes.

It was the continuation of a week for Hess that included clutch split conversions, a sudden-death roll-off and so many strikes in pressure situations.

Against Barnes, a 19-time PBA Tour champion and winner earlier this year on the PBA50 Tour, Hess struck 17 times. Barnes never threw more than three strikes in a row and left a flurry of 10 pins and 4 pins along the way.

The two wins over Barnes marked the third consecutive time the top seed at the Senior Masters was beaten twice and denied the title.

The last top seed to win, which only took one game, was Walter Ray Williams Jr. of Oxford, Florida, in 2017. The victory made him the first bowler to win the Masters and Senior Masters twice each.

Both of Williams' Masters titles came against Barnes, who reached the championship match three times as the No. 1 seed and was looking for redemption in the senior version.

The reason Barnes had two chances to win was because he still was unbeaten in the double-elimination format, and the final round was livestreamed, rather than broadcast on TV. That was not the case against Williams in 2004 and 2010 and Mike Fagan in 2012.

In five opportunities to win one of the titles, Barnes has averaged 219.6, while his opponents have averaged 263.8.

Total pinfall for three games determined the winner of each match in the 64-player double-elimination match-play bracket and the final shootout, while the championship round was single-game matches.

In the semifinal against Kent, Hess struck eight consecutive times after a second-frame 10 pin, while four consecutive nine-counts from Kent, starting in the third frame, put him behind more than 40

pins before his first double.

Hess' success against Weber denied him more than just the chance to be the first bowler to win the Senior Masters three times. Weber also entered the championship round as the front-runner for 2021 PBA50 Player of the Year honors. He won twice on the PBA50 Tour this season.

Weber, the 2013 and 2016 Senior Masters winner, fell behind early, leaving a 2-4-10 split in the second frame, which he was unable to convert. Hess started with a double and struck five times in the first seven frames, before a 3-6-7-9-10 split slowed the momentum.

Despite the opportunity, Weber didn't strike on the left lane until his fill ball. He did strike on four of five visits to the right lane, but it wasn't enough to make up the deficit.

In the opening match, Hess struck five times in his first six frames, and eight times overall, to outdistance Hogue. Hogue was slowed by an 8-10 split in the seventh frame, which came after his first double in the match.

Hess, Weber and Hogue advanced to the stepladder through the Elimination Bracket and a four-player shootout used to determine the final three seeds for the finals

Barnes and Kent earned their spots after moving unscathed through the Winners Bracket. Barnes topped Kent in the match to determine the No. 1 spot, 656-639.

The 2021 Senior Masters started with 223 competitors vying for one of the 63 open spots in the bracket with defending champion Amleto Monacelli of Venezuela, and matches took place over two days.

Monacelli finished tied for 25th place in his title defense. He was looking to become the first bowler to win back-to-back events since Tom Baker of King, North Carolina, accomplished the feat in 2007.

The event was the final tournament on the 2021 PBA50 Tour schedule, and the postseason awards are points-based. Barnes missed four events due to schedule conflicts with the PBA Tour and the death of his sister, Laura.

The Senior Masters is the premier event for USBC members age 50 and older. All competitors bowled 15 games over three days to determine who advanced to the bracket.

Venezuela's Amleto Monacelli was the best bowler at the 2021 Super Senior Classic, and he proved it with an 11-strike victory over local standout Ron Mohr in the title match at Sam's Town Bowling Center.

The United States Bowling Congress and Professional Bowlers Association Hall of Famer was a 2 pin away from perfection in the 279-201 win against Mohr, who was bowling for the Super Senior Classic title at Sam's Town for the third time in five appearances. The win earned Monacelli \$7,500.

Monacelli was making his debut at the premier event for USBC members age 60 and older, but it was not his first taste of success at the 56-lane facility. He won the 2019 Senior Masters there.

"I came in confident after winning earlier in the year and then finishing third at the (Senior) U.S. Open last week," said Monacelli, also a 10-time PBA50 Tour winner and 20-time PBA Tour titlist. "To continue that success today feels great. At the same time, I know I need to keep doing what I'm doing and not relax."

The right-hander earned the top seed for the stepladder after dominating the 157-player field across two days of qualifying, the Cashers' Round and six games of match play, averaging nearly 230 over the 24 games.

Mohr, a PBA Hall of Famer, won the Super Senior Classic in 2017 after finishing as the runner-up a year earlier. He earned the opportunity to become the event's first two-time winner with a clutch finish against New York's Glenn Smith in the semifinal.

Mohr converted the 4-9 split in the sixth frame and struck on his last four shots to sneak by Smith, 224-217.

In the first match of the championship round, Mohr struck four times in his first five frames to build a lead over Walter Ray Williams Jr. of Oxford, Florida. Mohr added three strikes late in the game for a 247-218 win over Williams.

The group stepladder matches that kicked off the action included the second, third and fourth seeds from each of the two match-play groups, with the winners claiming the No. 3 and No. 4 spots in the finals. Their seeding was based on their averages for the event.

In the Group A stepladder, Michael Karch of Edgewood, Washington, started the day with a 235-224 win over Hugh Miller of Mercer Island, Washington.

In the Group A final, Karch struck eight times, including his last five shots, but a 4-6-7-10 split in the fifth frame proved to be his undoing, allowing Williams to take the lead and lock up the victory with three strikes in his final frame. Williams, also a USBC and PBA Hall of Famer, advanced by a score of 238-232.

In the Group B stepladder, Mohr avenged a 2019 group stepladder loss to Darryl Bower of Middletown, Pennsylvania, 213-194.

Mohr's momentum continued against Widmar Vargas of Sun City Center, Florida. Vargas opened three times in the first six frames, while three consecutive strikes from Mohr, starting in the fourth frame, allowed him to cruise to a 216-166 win.

The 157 competitors rolled 12 games of qualifying over two days, before the field was cut to the top 40 for the six-game Cashers' Round.

The top 12 bowlers, based on their 18-game pinfall totals, advanced to round-robin match play, where they were split into two six-player groups - Group A and Group B - with all odd-numbered qualifiers going to Group A and all evens going to Group B.

At the conclusion of match play, the leader from each group automatically advanced to the final stepladder, earning the No. 1 and No. 2 seeds based on total pinfall for 24 games, including 30 bonus pins for each win in match play.

The Las Vegas area welcomed hundreds of bowlers age 50 and older over two weeks in August 2021, as two editions of the United States Bowling Congress Senior Championships headed to Sunset Station in Henderson, Nevada.

The double dose of top-tier senior competition kicked off with the 2020 USBC Senior Championships, which was postponed due to the COVID-19 pandemic. The initial event took place Aug. 3-6 at Sunset Station's Strike Zone.

The 2021 Senior Championships followed from Aug. 10-13, and both editions featured two divisions – Mixed and Women's – in six age-based classifications – 50-54, 55-59, 60-64, 65-69, 70-74, 75 and older.

The Senior Championships is a national event for bowlers who have qualified through their state's senior tournaments. Those who advanced for the 2020 tournament participated in the classification for which they originally qualified, regardless of age at time of competition.

Competitors bowled two three-game qualifying blocks. There were

12 national titles at stake, as well as a \$42,000 prize fund.

After six games of qualifying, the top six scores in each division, including handicap, advanced to a medal round.

Advancers bowled an additional three games, with total pinfall (including handicap) for the nine games, determining the champions.

The 2020 Senior Championships included more than 300 bowlers representing 44 states, with one champion, Alabama's M. Lynn Johnson (Women's 55-59), returning from the 2019 tournament in Cincinnati.

The 2021 Senior Championships welcomed more than 200 competitors from 27 states and followed the same format.

Nearly a dozen bowlers qualified for both events.





United States Bowling Congress delegates elected three board members and voted on 19 legislative proposals from 2020 and 2021, as the 2021 USBC Virtual Convention and Annual Meeting came to a close on April 29.

The ballot for the USBC Board of Directors election had five candidates slated by the USBC Nominating Committee – Jay Daryman of York, Pennsylvania; Dennis Hacker of Longtown, Missouri; Johnny Harris of Lynchburg, Virginia; Chrissy Lee of Tampa, Florida; and Jonathan Van Hees of Hope Valley, Rhode Island – with candidate Sue Schreiber of Medford, Wisconsin, running from the floor.

On the first ballot, Lee (437 votes), Hacker (378) and Daryman (351) were elected, with Schreiber receiving 333 votes, Van Hees receiving 232 votes and Harris receiving 158 votes.

A candidate had to receive a majority of votes from the 642 votes cast to be elected. The newly elected board members began their three-year terms on Aug. 1, 2021.

The delegates also ratified the 2020 appointments of Adam Mitchell of Myrtle Beach, South Carolina, Glenda Beckett of Palmetto Bay, Florida, and Tina Williams of Pflugerville, Texas, to the USBC Board.

Becky Young of McDonough, Georgia, and Dicki Ward of Oklahoma City joined the International Bowling Campus Youth Committee, which also returned current members Blair Blumenscheid of Harrisville, Utah, and Chad Estes of Statesville, North Carolina.

In addition to the board elections, delegates voted on proposals from 2020 and 2021 amendments, with six related to league rules, five for tournament rules and eight proposals for bylaws.

The 2020 USBC Convention and Annual Meeting were canceled in 2020 due to the COVID-19 pandemic.

Delegates approved of a league rule amendment that allows a league officer to authorize practice if a game or series is interrupted. One amendment to national bylaws was approved, which provides for the board to make emergency decisions, in extreme situations, to temporarily suspend bylaws and rules.

Two local associations also were recognized and celebrated based on their outstanding performance and service to their members. The Sioux Falls Regional USBC of Sioux Falls, South Dakota, and Fort Collins USBC of Fort Collins, Colorado, were selected for the USBC Association Excellence Awards for 2020 and 2021, respectively.

The presentation of national awards for 2020 and 2021 also were conducted during the week, including the recognition of the Alberta E. Crowe Star of Tomorrow Award winners Caroline Thesier of Mooresville, North Carolina (2020), and Katharina Mente of Keller, Texas (2021). Ryan Gatton of Owensboro, Kentucky, and Zachary Lewis of Medina, Ohio, were recognized as the 2020 and 2021 Chuck Hall Star of Tomorrow Award winners, respectively.

USBC President Melissa McDaniel and USBC Executive Director Chad Murphy presented their annual reports, and delegates heard reports from the USBC Strategic Planning Committee and from the International Bowling Campus Youth Development team.

During the week, delegates attended virtual educational seminars. The convention also featured video presentations from USBC charity partners Bowlers to Veterans Link, which provides recreational and therapeutic programs and services to America's active duty and veteran service men and women, and Bowl for the Cure®, the year-round fundraising initiative sponsored by USBC in partnership with Susan G. Komen®.

#### NOTE 1 SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES

The United States Bowling Congress, Inc. (USBC) was incorporated on June 3, 2004 in the state of Wisconsin for the purposes of developing interest and participation in the sport of bowling by overseeing competition and providing programs and services to its membership. USBC also administers a scholarship program, overseen by the SMART Oversight Committee established by USBC in 2021. USBC's revenues are derived primarily from membership dues and tournament entry fees, as well as investment returns as part of administering the scholarship program. The following footnotes report information for the years ended December 31, 2021 and 2020. Significant accounting policies followed by USBC are presented below.

#### **Use of Estimates**

The preparation of financial statements in conformity with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America (GAAP) requires management to make estimates and assumptions that affect the reported amounts of assets and liabilities and disclosure of contingent assets and liabilities at the date of the financial statements and the reported amounts of revenues and expenses during the reporting period. Actual results could differ from those estimates.

#### Cash Equivalents

USBC considers all liquid investments with a maturity of three months or less when purchased to be cash equivalents.

#### **Accounts Receivable**

Accounts receivable are uncollateralized obligations. Accounts receivable are stated at the invoice amount. Payments of accounts receivable are applied to the specific invoices identified on the remittance advice or, if unspecified, to the earliest unpaid invoices or unfunded scholarships.

The carrying amount of accounts receivable is reduced by a valuation allowance that reflects management's best estimate of amounts that will not be collected. The allowance for doubtful accounts is based on a calculated percentage of sales. If there is a deterioration of credit worthiness, or actual defaults are higher than the historical experience, management's estimates of recoverability of amounts due to USBC could be adversely affected. All accounts or portions thereof deemed to be uncollectible or to require an excessive collection cost are written off to the allowance for doubtful accounts. The allowance for doubtful accounts was \$-0- at December 31, 2021 and 2020.

#### Inventory

Inventory consists of resale merchandise and awards and is valued at the lower of cost or net realizable value with cost determined on a first-in, first-out (FIFO) basis.

#### NOTE 1 SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES (CONTINUED)

#### **Investments**

Investments are reported at fair value. Fair value is defined as the price that would be received to sell an asset in an orderly transaction between market participants at the measurement date. See Note 5 for discussion of fair value measurements. Purchases and sales of securities are recorded on a trade-date basis. Interest income is recorded on the accrual basis. Dividends are recorded on the ex-dividend date. Realized and unrealized gains and losses on investments are included in the statements of activities as net investment return.

#### **Risks and Uncertainties**

USBC utilizes various investment instruments. Investment securities, in general, are exposed to various risks, such as interest rate, credit, and overall market volatility. Due to the level of risk associated with certain investment securities, it is reasonably possible that changes in the values of investment securities will occur in the near term and that such change could materially affect USBC's account balances and the amounts reported in the financial statements.

#### Investment in International Bowling Campus, LLC

USBC owns a 50% interest in International Bowling Campus, LLC (IBC). The investment is accounted for using the equity method. Under the equity method, the investment is carried at cost, adjusted for USBC's proportionate share of undistributed earnings or losses, and capital contributions and distributions.

#### **Property and Equipment**

Property and equipment over \$5,000 with a useful life three years or more are stated at cost and depreciated on the straight-line method over their estimated useful lives, which range from 3 to 20 years.

Maintenance, repairs, and replacements are generally included as expenses of operations during the year in which the expense is incurred. Cost of replacements, which constitute improvements or extend the life of the respective assets, are recorded as additions to property and equipment.

#### Impairment of Long-Lived Assets

USBC reviews long-lived assets for impairment whenever events or changes in circumstances indicate the carrying amount of an asset may not be recoverable. Recoverability of assets to be held and used is measured by a comparison of the carrying amount of an asset to future undiscounted net cash flows expected to be generated by the asset. If such assets are considered to be impaired, the impairment to be recognized is measured by the amount by which the carrying amount of the assets exceeds the fair value of the assets. Assets to be disposed of are reported at the lower of carrying amount or fair value less costs to sell

#### NOTE 1 SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES (CONTINUED)

#### Goodwill

Goodwill is recorded when the cost of acquired businesses exceed the fair value of the identifiable net assets acquired. USBC has elected to amortize goodwill over an estimated useful life of 10 years.

#### **Net Assets**

Net assets, revenues, expenses, gains, and losses are classified based on the existence or absence of donor-imposed restrictions. However, donor-restricted contributions whose restrictions are met during the same year are directly reported as increases in net assets without donor restrictions. The net assets of USBC and changes therein are classified and reported as follows:

Net Assets Without Donor Restrictions – Net assets available for use in general operations and not subject to donor restrictions. The governing board has designated, from net assets without donor restrictions, net assets for an operating reserve.

#### Scholarship Awards Payable

USBC administers a scholarship program for the bowling community known as Scholarship Management and Accounting Reports for Tenpins. USBC collects, manages, and disburses scholarship funds for youth bowling scholarships. A scholarship awards payable is recorded for payments received. USBC effectively acts as an agent for these funds. Investment income is used to pay the administrative costs of operating the program. Investment income in excess of these administrative costs may be allocated to the accounts of the provider organizations.

#### Revenue Recognition

Revenue is recognized when performance obligations are met. Membership dues are recognized ratably over the period of membership. Unearned membership revenue is reflected as deferred revenue on the statements of financial position. Workshops and Seminars, Special Events, Booths, and Concessions, Tournament Entry and Prize Fees, Tournament and Conventions Subsidy, Brackets, and Advertising are recognized when the events are held. Tournament entry fees are collected in advance, resulting in deferred revenue (contract liability) on the statements of financial position. Royalty revenue is recognized quarterly based on use of preferred service providers and merchandise sales. Sponsorship revenue is recognized ratably over the sponsorship period. Bowlers Journal and BowlTV subscription revenue is recognized ratably over the subscription period, which provides access to either BowlTV or the Bowlers Journal.

Contributions are recognized when cash, securities or other assets, an unconditional promise to give, or notification of a beneficial interest is received. Conditional promises to give are not recognized until the conditions on which they depend have been substantially met.

#### NOTE 1 SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES (CONTINUED)

#### Deferred Revenue

National tournaments consist of tournament subsidies and tournament entry fees. These amounts are recognized as revenue in the period in which the event is held or the related expenses are incurred.

Membership dues are recognized in the fiscal year in which the individual receives the privileges that membership offers.

BowlTV subscriptions are recognized over the course of time which aligns with the individual subscription periods.

Bowlers Journal subscriptions are recognized over the course of time which aligns with the individual subscription periods.

#### Advertising

USBC expenses advertising costs as they are incurred.

#### **Functional Allocation of Expenses**

The costs of program and supporting services activities have been summarized on a natural basis in the statements of activities. The statements of functional expenses present the natural classification detail of expenses by function. Accordingly, certain costs have been allocated among the programs and supporting services benefited. The expenses that are allocated include salaries, fringe benefits, employee recruitment and training, professional services, supplies, awards, postage and freight, facilities, equipment maintenance and repairs, printing, promotion, sponsorships, and programs, travel, insurance, contributions, and miscellaneous expenses, which are allocated on the basis of estimates of time and effort

#### **Income Tax Status**

The Internal Revenue Service (IRS) has issued a determination letter dated October 5, 2004, granting USBC an exemption from federal income tax under IRS Code Section 501(c)(3). However, income received from certain activities is subject to income tax as unrelated business income. No income tax expense has been recorded in the financial statements as cumulative unrelated business net operating loss carryforwards would offset any current tax liability. In addition, a 100% valuation allowance has been provided against the deferred tax asset resulting from the net operating loss carryforwards. Management is not aware of any items that could cause revocation of the tax-exempt status.

#### Reclassification

Certain items in the 2020 financial statements have been reclassified, with no effect on previously reported net assets and changes in net assets, to conform with the current year presentation.

#### NOTE 1 SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES (CONTINUED)

#### **Accounting Pronouncements**

In February 2016, the Financial Accounting Standards Board (FASB) issued Accounting Standards Update (ASU) 2016-02, Leases (Topic 842), which is expected to increase transparency and comparability among organizations. The core principle of this guidance is that a lessee should recognize the assets and liabilities that arise from leases. The standard requires lessees to reflect most leases on their balance sheet as lease liabilities with a corresponding right-of-use asset, while leaving presentation of lease expense in the statement of income largely unchanged. The standard also eliminates the real-estate specific provisions that exist under current GAAP and modifies the classification criteria and accounting which lessors must apply to sales-type and direct financing leases. In June 2020, the FASB approved the delay of the effective date of ASU 2016-02 through issuance of ASU 2020-05, Revenue from Contracts with Customers (Topic 606) and Leases (Topic 842): Effective Dates for Certain Entities. The lease guidance is now effective for USBC's year ending December 31, 2022. Management will be evaluating the effects of the new standard.

#### NOTE 2 SMART MUTUAL TERMINATION AGREEMENT

On January 14, 2021, SMART Bowling Scholarship Funding Corporation (SMART) and USBC entered a Mutual Termination Agreement to terminate the March 23, 2010 Agreement (Initial Agreement) between the parties. On January 15, 2021, the initial Agreement was terminated, and SMART was subsequently dissolved. All of SMART's assets and liabilities were assumed by USBC. USBC subsequently established the SMART Oversight Committee to oversee the SMART operations as a program of USBC.

In connection with the Mutual Termination Agreement, USBC received the following assets and assumed the following liabilities:

USBC recognized the \$18,178,314 excess of assets received over liabilities assumed as an in-kind contribution. This amount is presented as "net assets obtained from SMART mutual termination agreement" on the statement of activities for the year ended December 31, 2021.

#### NOTE 3 LIQUIDITY AND AVAILABILITY

USBC's liquidity goal is to have sufficient assets available to meet operational expenditures for a 9-month period. USBC regularly reviews the liquidity required to meet the ongoing needs for membership, governance, research, and the services needed to support those functions. Various forms of funds are available which include cash, marketable investment securities, expected collections of receivables, and a commercial line of credit (see Note 14).

For the purpose of analyzing available resources, USBC reviews assets not covered by donor restrictions or restricted for future use. USBC also excludes assets related to the SMART program from their liquidity and availability calculation, which are overseen by the SMART Oversight Committee and designated for the ongoing needs of administering a scholarship program for the bowling community and the other services needed to support that function. As of December 31, 2021 and 2020, the following financial assets could readily be made available within one year of the statement of financial position date to meet general expenditures:

USBC maintains the investments above in investment vehicles that allow access to these funds for satisfaction of current liabilities.

USBC's Board Designated Reserve consists of investments internally designated for specific purposes. Although USBC does not intend to spend this board-designated reserve within the next year, these amounts could be made available if necessary.

In addition to financial assets available to meet operational expenditures, USBC operates with a balanced budget to ensure that the entity can meet current and future obligations. USBC believes that future revenues will be sufficient to cover expenditures without materially impacting the entity's liquidity.

#### NOTE 5 FAIR VALUE MEASUREMENTS

GAAP establishes a framework for measuring fair value. That framework provides a fair value hierarchy that prioritizes the inputs to valuation techniques used to measure fair value. The hierarchy gives the highest priority to unadjusted quoted prices in active markets for identical assets or liabilities (Level 1 measurements) and the lowest priority to unobservable inputs (Level 3 measurements). The three levels of the fair value hierarchy under GAAP are described as follows:

Level 1 – Inputs to the valuation methodology are unadjusted quoted prices for identical assets or liabilities in active markets.

Level 2 – Inputs to the valuation methodology include:

- quoted prices for similar assets or liabilities in active markets;
- quoted prices for identical or similar assets or liabilities in inactive markets;
- inputs other than quoted prices that are observable for the asset or liability;
- inputs that are derived principally from or corroborated by observable market data by correlation or other means.

If the asset or liability has a specified (contractual) term, the Level 2 input must be observable for substantially the full term of the asset or liability.

Level 3 – Inputs to the valuation methodology are unobservable and significant to the fair value measurement.

The asset or liability's fair value measurement level within the fair value hierarchy is based on the lowest level of any input that is significant to the fair value measurement. Valuation techniques used need to maximize the use of observable inputs and minimize the use of unobservable inputs.

Following is a description of the valuation methodologies used for assets measured at fair value.

#### NOTE 5 FAIR VALUE MEASUREMENTS (CONTINUED)

Equities: Valued based on the closing price reported in the active market in which the individual security is traded.

Mutual Funds: Valued based on quoted market prices, which represent the net asset value (NAV) of shares held by USBC at year-end.

Hedge Fund: Valued based on the NAV per unit (or its equivalent) based upon the fair value of the underlying investments. NAV is used as a practical expedient to estimate fair value. The investment strategy of the hedge fund is to maximize long-term total return, consistent with prudent investment management. The fund seeks to achieve its objective by investing in at least 70% in other commingled investment vehicles, in investment grade debt and fixed income securities rated at the time of purchase at least Baa3 or BBB- by a nationally recognized rating agency. USBC has no additional committed capital obligations.

Limited Partnerships: USBC is invested in four limited partnerships. The limited partnerships are valued at an amount equal to the ownership interest in the partners' capital, NAV, used as a practical expedient to estimate fair value. Two partnerships have a 10-year term after final closing, subject to two two-year extensions at the election of the General Partner. The investment strategy of these two limited partnerships is to achieve attractive risk-adjusted returns relative to more liquid fixed income alternatives, with an emphasis on current income and preservation of capital. The fund seeks to achieve its objective primarily by investing in senior secured, floating rate middle market loans, through wholly and partially owned holding companies and other investment vehicles.

One partnership will continue until July 31, 2031, subject to three one-year extensions at the election of the General Partner. The investment strategy of this limited partnership is to generate significant returns principally through long-term capital appreciation, by making, holding and disposing of privately negotiated equity and equity related investments in venture capital and private equity partnerships and operating companies, primarily in the healthcare, information technology, communications, and digital asset industries.

The last partnership is open-ended, allowing USBC to withdraw or submit a repurchase request at the end of the 3-year quarter date. The investment strategy of this limited partnership is to net 8%-10% yields through long-term leases on investments in long-lived, capital-intensive transportation assets (aircraft, rail, maritime, vehicles, equipment and energy logistics).

In each limited partnership, USBC may not sell, assign, or transfer its interest except with prior written consent of the General Partner. Withdrawals of capital are not permitted except in limited instances.

#### NOTE 5 FAIR VALUE MEASUREMENTS (CONTINUED)

The methods described above may produce a fair value calculation that may not be indicative of net realizable value or reflective of future fair values. Furthermore, while USBC believes its valuation methods are appropriate and consistent with other market participants, the use of different methodologies or assumptions to determine the fair value of certain financial instruments could result in a different fair value measurement at the reporting date.

#### NOTE 7 GOODWILL

During the year ended December 31, 2020, USBC purchased the *Bowlers Journal International* magazine, *Pro Shop Operator* magazine and its related business operations, including Bowlers Journal Championships bowling tournament for \$350,000. No identifiable net assets were acquired by USBC through this purchase. Therefore, \$350,000 was attributed to goodwill at the time of purchase. The statement of financial position includes \$303,333 and \$338,333 of goodwill, net of \$46,667 and \$11,667 of accumulated amortization as of December 31, 2021 and 2020, respectively, and the statement of activities includes \$35,000 and \$11,667 of related amortization expense for the years ended December 31, 2021 and 2020, respectively.

#### NOTE 8 POSTRETIREMENT BENEFIT OBLIGATION

USBC provides defined benefit postretirement health and life benefits to certain current and former employees. Covered employees became eligible for these benefits at retirement after meeting minimum age and service requirements.

The postretirement health care plan is unfunded. The following reconciles the change in accumulated benefit obligation and the amounts included in the statements of financial position at December 31:

#### NOTE 9 RETIREMENT PLANS

USBC participates in a 401(k) retirement plan, along with Bowling Proprietors' Association of America, Inc. (BPAA), International Bowling Museum and Hall of Fame, Inc. (IBM&HF), IBC, and IBC Youth Bowling, Inc. (IBCYB), available to all employees who have reached the age of 21 and completed one month of service. Employees may contribute to their accounts up to the annual amount allowed by law. USBC matches 100% of the first 3% of employee contributions, plus 50% of the next 2% of the employee's contribution.

Total contribution expense recorded under the plan was \$198,768 and \$215,398 for the years ended December 31, 2021 and 2020, respectively.

#### NOTE 11 SIGNIFICANT ESTIMATES, CONCENTRATIONS, AND CONTINGENCIES

GAAP requires disclosure of information about certain significant estimates and current vulnerabilities due to certain concentrations. These matters include the following:

#### Reserve for Self-Insurance

Under its self-insurance plan, USBC accrues the estimated expense of health care claims costs based on claims filed subsequent to year-end and an additional amount for incurred but not yet reported claims based on prior experience. Accruals for such costs of \$106,455 and \$93,828 are included in accrued liabilities at December 31, 2021 and 2020, respectively. Claims payments based on actual claims ultimately filed could differ materially from these estimates.

#### Concentration of Credit Risk

USBC maintains the majority of its cash and investments in two commercial banks. Balances on deposit are insured by the Federal Deposit Insurance Corporation up to specified limits. Balances in excess of these limits are uninsured.

#### NOTE 12 RELATED PARTY TRANSACTIONS

BPAA is represented by two members on the USBC board of directors. For various shared costs, USBC has a receivable of \$203,497 and \$133,328 from BPAA as of December 31, 2021 and 2020, respectively. BPAA provided \$542,902 and \$267,159 to USBC during the years ended December 31, 2021 and 2020, respectively, for operations.

USBC is represented by one member on Contemporary Bowling Association's (CBA) board of directors and appoints a second. USBC has a receivable from CBA of \$5,674 and a payable to CBA of \$12,068 as of December 31, 2021 and 2020, respectively. USBC provided \$242,599 and \$240,000 for operations to CBA for the years ended December 31, 2021 and 2020, respectively.

USBC provides certain shared services to IBM&HF. USBC has a payable to IMB&HF of \$299 and \$1,299 as of December 31, 2021 and 2020, respectively. USBC contributed \$80,603 and \$72,534 to IBM&HF for the years ended December 31, 2021 and 2020, respectively.

Effective February 1, 2018, USBC provided IBM&HF a \$100,000 loan at 0% interest. Full payment is due February 1, 2023. Imputed interest income is included on the statement of activities in the amount of \$4,106 and \$3,929 for the years ended December 31, 2021 and 2020, respectively. The rate used to calculate the imputed interest on the loan is 4.5%. The outstanding loan is presented on the statement of financial position as a note receivable, net of an unamortized discount of \$4,650 and \$8,756 as of December 31, 2021 and 2020, respectively.

#### NOTE 12 RELATED PARTY TRANSACTIONS (CONTINUED)

IBCYB is represented by two members of the USBC board of directors. USBC has a payable to IBCYB of \$31,262 and a receivable from IBCYB of \$4,706 as of December 31, 2021 and 2020, respectively. USBC contributed \$16,276 to IBCYB during the years ended December 31, 2021 and 2020, respectively.

USBC leases its facilities from IBC under a noncancelable operating lease agreement. The lease includes automatic extensions for one-year terms until cancelled by either party. Rent payments under the lease include an annual base rent of \$1 per year and USBC's proportionate share of taxes and operating expenses in accordance with the agreement, which is determined to be the equivalent of market rate rent. Rent payments to IBC totaled \$968,328 and \$969,336 for the years ended December 31, 2021 and 2020, respectively. USBC also provides IBC with the use of various employees at no cost, resulting in an in-kind contribution of \$80,975 for each of the years ended December 31, 2021 and 2020. USBC has a receivable from IBC of \$424,176 and \$342,764 as of December 31, 2021 and 2020, respectively.

#### NOTE 13 COMMITMENTS

USBC has entered into agreements to sponsor various events through 2022. Committed amounts related to these agreements for the future events are approximately \$125,000 at December 31, 2021.

On July 1, 2017, USBC's SMART Oversight Committee invested in a limited partnership. As part of this investment, USBC has committed \$2,000,000 in future contributions to be called upon at the discretion of the General Partner. As of December 31, 2021, USBC has contributed \$1,750,000 of their \$2,000,000 committed capital. USBC's unfunded committed capital as of December 31, 2021 and 2020 is \$250,000 and \$250,000, respectively.

On December 13, 2019, USBC's SMART Oversight Committee invested in a limited partnership. As part of this investment, USBC has committed \$1,000,000 in future contributions to be called upon at the discretion of the General Partner. As of December 31, 2021, USBC has contributed \$900,000 of its committed capital. USBC's unfunded committed capital as of December 31, 2021 and 2020 is \$100,000 and \$500,000, respectively.

#### NOTE 14 LINE OF CREDIT

USBC has a \$4,000,000 revolving line of credit agreement with a bank. Borrowings under the line of credit bear interest at 3.50% and 3.25% as of December 31, 2021 and 2020, respectively. The line is unsecured and matures on September 26, 2022. No borrowings on the line of credit were outstanding at December 31, 2021 and 2020.

#### NOTE 15 LEASES

USBC leases office equipment under various operating leases expiring at various dates through 2023.

#### NOTE 16 PAYCHECK PROTECTION PROGRAM LOAN FORGIVENESS

In January 2021, USBC received proceeds in the amount of \$1,614,700 from Frost Bank to fund payroll, rent, utilities, and interest on mortgages and existing debt through the Paycheck Protection Program (Second PPP Loan). The Second PPP Loan bears interest at a fixed rate of 1.0% per annum, has a term of five years, and is unsecured and guaranteed by the U.S. Small Business Administration (SBA). Payment of principal and interest is deferred until the date on which the amount of forgiveness is remitted by the SBA to the lender or, if the USBC fails to apply for forgiveness within 10 months after the covered period, then payment of principal and interest shall begin on that date. These amounts are subject to forgiveness based on compliance with program requirements and approval by the SBA.

The Second PPP Loan was forgiven by the SBA on December 20, 2021. Therefore, USBC was legally released from the debt and the loan forgiveness has been recognized as a contribution on the statement of activities during the year ended December 31, 2021.

In April 2020, USBC received proceeds in the amount of \$1,693,900 from Frost Bank to fund payroll, rent, utilities, and interest on mortgages and existing debt through the Paycheck Protection Program (First PPP Loan). The First PPP Loan bears interest at a fixed rate of 1.0% per annum, has a term of two years, and is unsecured and guaranteed by the SBA. Payment of principal and interest is deferred until the date on which the amount of forgiveness is remitted by the SBA to the lender or, if the USBC fails to apply for forgiveness within 10 months after the covered period, then payment of principal and interest shall begin on that date. These amounts are subject to forgiveness based on compliance with program requirements and approval by the SBA.

The First PPP Loan was forgiven by the SBA on December 2, 2020. Therefore, USBC was legally released from the debt and the loan forgiveness has been recognized as a contribution on the statement of activities during the year ended December 31, 2020.

The SBA may review funding eligibility and usage of funds for compliance with program requirements based on dollar thresholds and other factors. The amount of liability, if any, from potential noncompliance cannot be determined with certainty; however, management is of the opinion that any review will not have a material adverse impact on USBC's financial position.

#### NOTE 17 SUBSEQUENT EVENTS

Management evaluated subsequent events through June 24, 2022, the date the financial statements were available to be issued. Events or transactions occurring after December 31, 2021, but prior to June 24, 2022 that provided additional evidence about conditions that existed at December 31, 2021, have been recognized in the financial statements for the year ended December 31, 2021. Events or transactions that provided evidence about conditions that did not exist at December 31, 2021, but arose before the financial statements were available to be issued, have not been recognized in the financial statements for the year ended December 31, 2021.
